



Customer Focused . Safety Driven

Northern Wasco County People's Utility District is a "not-for-profit" customer-owned utility. The Board of Directors meets on 1st Tuesday of each month at 6 p.m.

Bill Pay Options:

- Pay in person or mail payments.
- Drop boxes located at office and at East 3rd Street near City Hall.
- Pay bill by cash, check, eCheck or Credit Card.
- E-Z and Auto Pay allows electronic transfers from checking or savings.
- Budget Payment spreads the cost evenly throughout the year.
- Levelized Payment is an average of recent 12 billings or number of billed months.

Discount Program

 Senior and/or Disabled Discounts are offered to customers year round who are income qualified, 60 years or older, or who are disabled. must qualify through MCCAC.

Gift Certificates

• Gift certificates can be purchased; redeemed as payment on utility bill.

Operations:

- Call (541) 296-2226, 24/7 to report an outage.
- Installs, repairs and rebuilds electrical power system.

Tree Trimming

- If planting within 30 feet of power line, plant trees that grow no higher than 25 feet.
- Trims and removes trees when they interfere with distribution, primary (high voltage) and secondary (individual service) power lines.

Engineering:

- Works with customers to establish new service.
- Maintains the District's infrastructure.

Hydro:

- NWCPUD owns and operates two hydroelectric plants.
- The Dalles North Shore Plant produces five MW.
 Power produced is sold to Portland General Electric with revenues credited to NWCPUD customers.
- McNary North Shore Plant produces ten MW, which is split equally with our partner Klickitat County PUD. The District's portion of the power produced is transmitted to The Dalles and is used as base load power.

Energy Conservation:

- Energy audits for residential, commercial and industrial are offered free.
- Customers must complete Energy Audit Application.
- Upon completion of audit a written report will be given to customer.
- Upon completion of inspection of weatherization improvement customer may qualify for rebate, and income qualified households may be eligibile for special programs.
- Heat pump rebates do not require audit; NWCPUD needs to be contacted for eligibility confirmation.
- Appliance rebates are available.

Power Supply:

- Over 90% of energy provided by NWCPUD is supplied by BPA and 100% is delivered to NWCPUD Substations on BPA transmission lines.

Neighbor To Neighbor

- PROGRAM OVERVIEW -

- » The Neighbor to Neighbor Program has been in existence since 1990. Through donations from caring customers, employees and our PUD match approved by the Board of Directors the Neighbor to Neighbor Program has raised \$9,152 in the last 12 months.
- » Anytime a security deposit was paid from Neighbor to Neighbor funds and is refunded back to a customer that money paid out goes back to the Neighbor to Neighbor fund to be used again by another PUD customer in need. Over the last 12 months over \$1,011 was returned to be used again. It's like a gift that keeps on giving!
- » Neighbor to Neighbor is not a welfare program. It is for emergency situations and disbursed on a case by case basis—one donation per eligible household up to \$125 in a 12 month period.
- » 100% of funds collected are disbursed by Mid-Columbia Community Action Council, who determines and verifies low-income eligibility to the households in our community who "fall through the cracks". All funds collected stay right here in our community.



- PROGRAM OVERVIEW -

REGIONAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

In coordination with community partners, MCEDD develops and implements a regional economic development strategy. We provide specific focus on broadband, infrastructure and transportation initiatives.

INDUSTRY DEVELOPMENT

Activities include support for infrastructure development and efforts to establish and grow industry alliances including Gorge Cider Society, the Gorge Tech Alliance, Renewable Energy Zone and many others.

BUSINESS FINANCING

To help businesses create and retain jobs, MCEDD provides loans for business financing needs with favorable rates, terms and requirements. MCEDD is a gap funder, working in partnership with financial institutions or when they are unable to provide financing. MCEDD serves five counties in two states bordering the Columbia River.



By giving parents and educators proper training in dyslexia they will be empowered to discern dyslexia warning signs and use appropriate accommodation that can change the life of dyslexic children.

We understand that our current education model is burdened and not yet capable of utilizing evidence and research-based remediation programs specific for students who show signs of dyslexia. CGDF hopes to lighten the financial load by providing resources for early screening, teacher training, access to appropriate assistive technologies and tutoring scholarships. We believe the Columbia River Gorge can be a shining example of a community that nourishes its children to reach their greatest potential.

Dyslexia is a language-based learning difference. It refers to a cluster of symptoms that result in difficulties with specific language skills, especially word decoding, reading comprehension and or reading fluency. Dyslexia can be mild or severe.

Dyslexia affects the brain. Specifically, it affects the part of the brain where the sounds are put together to form words and where words are broken down into sounds.

Learning Differences are not related to IQ. They do not affect how INTELLIGENT a person is.







HAVEN is the only nonprofit community-based organization providing comprehensive services to victims of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, stalking and trafficking in Wasco, Sherman, Gilliam, and Wheeler Counties. HAVEN also provides services to surrounding communities along the Columbia River Gorge and the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs Reservation. The organization began in 1981 with a very small group of concerned citizens. One of the first services HAVEN offered was a 24-hour crisis-line, which continues today as vital part of our on-going safety net.

HAVEN FROM DOMESTIC AND SEXUAL VIOLENCE

- PROGRAM OVERVIEW -

The current configuration of services offered by HAVEN includes: 24-hour crisis line and crisis response; emergency shelter; emergency financial assistance; help filing for crime victims' compensation and protection orders; advocacy with the medical, civil, and criminal justice systems; and individual and group counseling. All of these services are provided bilingually/biculturally for Spanish speakers. In addition to direct services, HAVEN offers rape prevention education and healthy teen relationship curriculum for K-12 schools throughout our region, training for allied professionals, and informational presentations to community groups.

HAVEN uses an "empowerment approach" that places change agency with the survivors, to help them plan for safety, develop self-efficacy, and recover from abuse. This approach is grounded in the belief that victims of violence should have access to information, education, and other necessary social and economic support to make informed decisions that best reflect their interests and needs. We know that survivors are the best experts on their lives and HAVEN provides survivor-centered services that recognize and build on their inherent strengths and resiliencies. Our philosophy and our process disrupt self-blaming beliefs and encourage survivors to recognize their coping skills, their ability to adapt to difficult circumstances, their problem-solving skills, their ability to seek safety for themselves and their children, and their ability to recover from the trauma of abuse.



It doesn't really matter what the 'reason', a youth away from their family is in a very precarious position, vulnerable to many forms of danger.

Y.E.S. is licensed by DHS as a child caring agency, and staff are trained to provide support that addresses the needs of youth in a manner that empowers them to move toward adulthood with confidence. We work closely with the network of community service agencies in our area to find strategic interventions that address the issues contributing to the homeless situations. We often see hope come alive in these youth who then develop a vision for a path forward.





- PROGRAM OVERVIEW -

Diversity Studio was launched in 2017, founded by Toni Sheppard, a personal support worker for members of the special needs community. The program was born out of a deficit of activities available and affordable to our clientele, many of whom are on a fixed income or are reliant on state assistance.

Diversity Studio is currently divided into three classes: arts and crafts class has been the longest running and provides a variety of materials and processes for making art, including painting with water colors and acrylics, as well as pottery, usually with a seasonal flavor. These classes follow a general -outline, but artists are encouraged to experiment and follow their inspiration.

ONE COMMUNITY HEALTH

- PROGRAM OVERVIEW -

One Community Health is the Columbia River Gorge's nonprofit community and migrant health center. We provide an integrated approach to medical, dental and behavioral health care, plus offer substance use disorder treatment and health education that supports total wellness.

Families turn to us time and time again for everything from obstetrics to pediatric care, youth dental prevention and treatment programs, and our School-Based Health Center, now available to all students living in Hood River County School District. Patients come to us not just for their acute needs but to thrive through whole-person health.

We began in 1986 as La Clínica del Cariño, a clinic for migrant farmworkers and their families. Over the years, One Community Health has responded to our community's needs by expanding our mission and services. Thanks to our improved access to care and the loyalty of our talented staff, we are growing our impact and reach. In addition, we enroll and assist more people in Medicaid than any other organization in The Gorge.

Today, celebrating more than 30 years of service, we are grateful as well as proud to offer affordable, high-quality care to all people living in Hood River, Wasco, Skamania and Klickitat Counties.

- GIVING OPPORTUNITIES -

Gifts enable us to provide care for local people such as:

- » Robert:* It was a scorching hot day in the Gorge when Robert showed up for his appointment—eight hours early. Homeless, skin parched from the sun, and suffering from incredible sores and pain, Robert simply hoped he might be seen sooner than his scheduled time. The team at OCH jumped into action, not just tending to his immediate medical needs but taking extra steps to restore some semblance of dignity to the patient's endangered sense of self. We sponge-bathed his body. Trimmed his beard. Cut his nails. And then, staff pulled cash from their own pockets to buy him basic clothes and food before we all said goodbye. Upon leaving our care, he thanked us, saying he felt like a human again.
- » Bill: A local carpenter without health insurance, Bill hadn't seen a doctor in eight years when he decided to make an appointment for a painful sore on his nose. After receiving a diagnosis of basal cell cancer, OCH staff helped him get medical insurance and the life-saving treatment he needed.
- » Natalia: School was never easy for Natalia, who had struggled with a lisp for as long as she and her parents could remember. Her classmates poked fun at her. And Natalia's teacher reprimanded her when she couldn't talk quite right. Our dental team immediately recognized her challenge: Natalia was tonguetied. Through a simple dental procedure, OCH addressed the long-overlooked issue, instantly freeing the young girl from both her physical challenge and emotional pain. At her checkup, Natalia just smiled and smiled, happy to simply stick her tongue up to her teeth—and talk without a lisp. Her father, also all grins, told us that at last, Natalia was happy to go to school.



COLUMBIA GORGE FOOD BANK

- PROGRAM OVERVIEW -

Columbia Gorge Food Bank (CGFB) is a transitional program of Oregon Food Bank supporting hunger relief partners in the Wasco, Hood River and Sherman counties. CGFB receives and aggregates donations from grocery stores, local orchards and farmers and food drives. As a member of the Oregon Network of Regional Food Banks CGFB receives USDA Commodities, donations from the food industry, produce and other sources.

CGFB currently serves 25 regional hunger relief partners providing services at 33 sites. During the last fiscal year 1,152,204 pounds were distributed to Partner agencies, a significant increase over the previous year. Twenty two percent of those pounds were fresh produce. Our partner agencies serve approximately 5000 people each month.

Efforts are underway to add school food pantries and additional rural sites throughout the region.



HOOD RIVER - TSURUTA SISTER CITY, INC.

- PROGRAM OVERVIEW -

Hood River - Tsuruta Sister City, Inc. was established in July 1977 by Tsuruta Mayor Kenji Nakano, Hood River Mayor Charles Beardsley and citizen Ray "Chop" Yasui. The primary goal of this partnership was to promote friendship and cultural understanding between residents of Tsuruta and Hood River. Since that time an active exchange program among adults and students has continued to develop. Since its inception, more than 1,752 people have taken part in visits and exchanges in the last 40 years. A strong friendship and cultural understanding between the people of the two towns continues to flourish.

SISTER CITY PROJECTS:

Jr. High and High School Exchanges to Tsuruta: Every other year, Hood River youth have an opportunity to visit Tsuruta for approximately 10 days.

Student Visits to Hood River: In the spring and fall of every year, students and adults from Tsuruta visit Hood River.

Adult Exchange Visits: Every five years, adults travel between the two cities. Adults are also welcome to travel with the student exchanges.

CIR Position: Each year, Tsuruta hires a Hood River citizen as their Coordinator for International Relations. This is a salaried position in which the CIR lives and works in Tsuruta for a one-year contract.

Scholarships: A scholarship is awarded to a qualifying Hood River senior each year.





Hood River Shelter Services (HRSS) is a coalition of community members representing service providers, nonprofit organizations, faith-based communities, government agencies, and local businesses who have come together to ensure that everyone in our community has access a warm, safe place to sleep during the winter.

PURPOSE

The purpose of Hood River Shelter Services is to provide a safe and warm space for those without resources for housing, or with inadequate housing. Unsheltered persons, especially those living with medical, mental health, or addiction issues, are even more vulnerable in times of inclement weather. Hood River Shelter Services operates under Standard Operating Procedures, and these procedures ensure the safe and effective operation of HRSS for staff and volunteers, as well as safeguarding the guests we serve.

FISH FOOD BANK

- PROGRAM OVERVIEW -

FISH Food Bank started in 1969 when a small group of community members noticed that their neighbors didn't seem to have enough to eat. They gathered some food and discreetly left it for the neighbors. They did the same thing the next week, and the next, and the next... and they haven't stopped since.

FISH Food Bank's primary purpose is to provide food for the hungry in Hood River County. FISH operates three distribution sites in the county – Hood River, Parkdale, and Cascade Locks, with the Hood River location serving as the primary distribution and warehouse site. Last year, FISH provided food for over 1,200 different families, feeding over 4,000 different individuals, with 38% of them being children. This translates into a monthly average 400+ families/individuals including children, seniors, working moms and dads, and others living below the federal poverty level. To receive food at the FISH Food Bank sites, individuals must meet financial and residential qualifications.

Last year, FISH received nearly 200,000 pounds of donated food from local individuals, farms, and businesses. In addition, FISH uses monetary donations to purchase around 150,000 lbs of food from the Oregon Food Bank, Rosauers, Safeway, and Columbia Food Service. All together 350,000 lbs of food is distributed to individuals and families of Hood River County.

- GIVING OPPORTUNITIES -

FISH Food Bank is thankful to be able to obtain USDA food and other donated food for our clients through our partnership with Oregon Food Bank and Columbia Gorge Food Bank.

For more than 50 years, FISH has survived on the generosity of this community for both food and operating expenses. FISH is continually in need of donations of food and volunteers. Specific foods we can use include the following: any nonperishable foods (such as tuna, canned soup, stew or chili), cooking oil, foods high in nutrients (such as canned vegetables and fruit), or whole grain foods.

COLUMBIA GORGE CASA

- PROGRAM OVERVIEW -

This past year over 165 children in Wasco, Sherman and Hood River counties found themselves in foster care; removed from their homes because of parental substance abuse, criminal behavior, violence, mental health issues, and/or medical neglect.

Foster care is a rough road to walk down alone, but CASA volunteers walk with each child and act as a much-needed voice during this traumatic time. CASAs ensure that the child is receiving needed health, education, and social services by reporting their findings and recommendations to the judge and by working closely with DHS case workers, teachers, healthcare providers, counselors, and foster parents. Finally, they advocate to ensure that the child's legal case progresses so that they are placed in a permanent, loving home as soon as possible. Perhaps most importantly, CASAs often serve as the only consistent adult for the child during their time in foster care – a time when little else is consistent.

Columbia Gorge CASA is the only program in Wasco, Hood River and Sherman counties authorized by the court to recruit, train and supervise community members to advocate for foster kids. This year, 56 CASA volunteers advocated for 130 children, but 35 children did not have a CASA because we did not have enough volunteers.

It is an effective program of well-trained and supported court-appointed community members stepping forward to deliver greater government efficiency and significantly improved outcomes for our community's most vulnerable children. 





MCCAC offers several different Energy Assistance programs designed to offset the rising cost of home heating. Seniors and disabled families are given a first priority status. The Energy Assistance program opens to the general public Dec. 2nd.

Money saved on heating costs can be put toward other important bills such as; food, rent, medicine, transportation or even daycare.

MCCAC's Weatherization funds enable low-income families to received free energy audits, energy education workshops and get their homes weatherized at no cost.

MCCAC's Housing programs can assist people who are literally homeless get off the streets and into permanent housing. The agency also has funds to provide rent assistance and eviction prevention.

MCCAC also administers an SSVF housing grant for Veterans who are facing housing or homeless situations.

FORT DALLES MUSEUM

- PROGRAM OVERVIEW -

The Fort Dalles Museum gives insight into daily life in Oregon during the mid-1800s to the early 20th century. It's not simply a fort in the typical sense. Fort Dalles and the Anderson Homestead, instead, showcase two homes, a barn, sheds, tools, and personal items used by army officers living at the fort, and an area farming family. The museum is great for history buffs, kids, and families alike.

Fort Dalles Museum, in The Dalles, Oregon, is housed in the former Surgeon's Quarters; the only remaining officer's quarters of the 1856 Fort Dalles military complex. One of Oregon's oldest history museums, it first opened its doors in 1905.

A group of civic-minded pioneer women were instrumental in saving the building at the turn of the century. Through an act of Congress, it became the property of the Oregon Historical Society as they were a recognized non-profit organization. OHS authorized the ladies of the "Old Fort Dalles Historical Society" to open it as a museum in 1905.
